Call for Papers

This is the first call for papers and submissions to the E-Journal of International and Comparative LABOUR STUDIES. The EJCLS is committed to rigorous scholarship and quality. All articles will be subject to independent refereeing before being accepted for publication.

The following is a list of indicative, but far from exhaustive, topic areas:

- collective and individual labour issues;
- equality and discrimination;
- school-to-work transition;
- industrial relations;
- vulnerable workers and precarious working;
- employment productivity;
- role of skills and human capital in a global context
- immigration issues.
- labour law

We are interested in contributions to the articles and commentary sections of the Journal:

Articles

Papers for publication should usually be between 6,000 and 10,000 words in length. The subject matter should be international in context or be of interest to an international audience. This includes papers on international and comparative labour issues, but also includes national developments in labour studies that will be of general interest. Authors should follow the style guidelines, to be found below. All submissions should include an abstract of not more than 250 words.

Authors should also submit a separate document with their name, title, qualifications, institutional affiliation and e-mail contact details.

Articles submitted will be blind refereed before being accepted for publication.

Commentary

Submissions for the Commentary section of the Journal should be a maximum of 4,000 words in length. These can be critical commentaries on labour developments in single countries or on international or comparative developments, including commentary on the implementation of laws and important cases. The purpose of this section is to give researchers the opportunity to comment on specific developments, trends or events without having to develop the critique into a full length article.

Authors should follow the style guidelines, to be found below. All submissions should include an abstract of not more than 250 words. Authors should also submit a separate document with their name, title, qualifications, institutional affiliation and e-mail contact details.

Submissions for the Commentary section will be refereed by the Managing Editor and members of the Scientific and Editorial Board of the Journal.

In all cases concerning publication in the Journal, the Editors' decision will be the final one.
